



Room Set Up Officers




Membership Officer

Receiving emails from our club

If you have found that important messages from our Club email address (<u>belroseprobus@yahoo.com.au</u>) have ended up in your Junk folder, this may be because your Outlook system may not have recognised the incoming email as being from a friendly source. To solve the problem, you could add our Club email address to the Safe Sender List in Office Outlook (if you have versions 10 or later). I know, you have never heard of such a thing! Here is how to act if you wish:

 Open Outlook - click 'Home' tab then 'Junk' button Select "Junk E-mail Options" from the list. Go to Safe Senders tab in Junk E-mail Options window. Click 'Add' button, type in the trusted email address as noted in blue earlier and then click the 'OK' button.

Alternatively, add the Club email address into your contact list and it is far less likely to go to Junk.

If you use yahoo, hotmail or gmail or one of the many others, perhaps check the "settings" or "safety options" or google what approach may be available from your particular service provider.

Mozambique experienced widespread flooding, turning it into a crocodile infested lake. Chirindza was forced to climb a tree to avoid crocodiles.


For four days, she stayed in the tree and gave birth to her daughter, Rositha on the fourth day. A South African military helicopter rescued both mother and daughter shortly thereafter. The miracle child and mother were later rewarded with the support of several charities.

Chirindza remembers the four days of misery though: "I had no food or water. I was feeling dizzy and I was scared I would fall into the waters and drown. I still have nightmares of Rosita tumbling into the rivers running beneath our feet and being dragged away from me. I still can't believe we both survived to tell our story".





We hope visitors to our Sanctuary will understand our residents may not be overly active, or looking quite as good as they did in their younger years, but they have done their bit in their former careers to educate and entertain us and can now sit back and enjoy retirement in a tranquil and peaceful environment. At Banana Cabana we do not breed or trade animals, nor do we purposely seek to acquire monkeys of a different species to enhance our collection. Our monkeys stay with us for the rest of their lives, and we commit to providing the ultimate for each of them as an individual.

In consideration of our monkeys, we limit the days and times our Sanctuary accepts guests, and every guest is accompanied by a qualified keeper at all times.

Your support in visiting our Sanctuary is truly, sincerely, appreciated, and enables us to continue to care for our beautiful residents.

The Sydney General Post Office (GPO) was constructed in two stages, beginning in 1866 and designed under the guidance of colonial architect James Barnet. On September 1, 1874, the first stage of the GPO was opened, and Sydney was mesmerised by the first major building development in Sydney. In 1891, the clock tower was finally completed, and the bells rang out across Sydney for the first time.

PARKING CONCESSIONS AT NBH

On entering the car park building take a ticket and if you want a concession, you must take this ticket to Concierge. DO NOT LEAVE IT IN THE CAR.

Eligible Concession Cards are:

- 1. Australian Pension Card.
- 2. Australian Government Health Card
- 3. War Vets gold card.
- 4. Disability Parking Permit.

These cards allow you 3 hours free parking. When ready to leave the hospital go to the Concierge who will ask for your entry ticket. They will also ask you to show your concession card and then will swap your entry ticket for an exit pass which you take straight to the exit gate, scan, and the boom gate will let you out.

If you go over the 3 hours, ask Concierge for a Parking Voucher. This is a single visit ticket valid for one entry and one exit only within a 24 hour period. This is a cost of \$6.50, payable at the pay station of the parking building.

Multi pass tickets are available for those making frequent entries and exits to the hospital. A 3 day pass is \$13 and a 7 day pass is \$26. Ask Concierge for an application form. Patients receiving any forms of cancer treatment and those receiving dialysis do not pay parking fees.
