

"ENID" BY ROBERT WAINWRIGHT

Six members of our book club met for coffee and discussion of our latest book Enid on Tuesday 8th April. What a diverse discussion it was, ranging from "didn't like it at all" to "truly loved it."

Enid. Who knew that Australia "owned" such an intriguing character as Enid Lindeman, granddaughter of Henry Lindeman, the winemaker who put the Hunter Valley wine region on the map in the 1860's.

Her life was as grand and exotic as she was - a statuesque beauty with alluring blue eyes and amazing subtle hair blond who turned heads wherever she went, be it in Sydney, New York, London or her opulent mansion La Fiorentina on the French where Riviera she entertained lavishly.

Enid married four times and became a widow four times, all her husbands dying from various ailments. Three children resulted from these marriages but, even as a mother, her life remained a kaleidoscope of promiscuity, extreme wealth, famous friends such as Somerset Maughan, Elizabeth Taylor and Winston Churchill and huge idiosyncrasies – she enjoyed animals so much she often wore a hyrax (had to look that one up!) round her neck.

Robert Wainwright has well written an intriguing biography of a fabulous, jet setting Australian woman and of a woman, that I'm guessing, most of us have never heard.
